Board of Education News

Potential Public Question Update

At the December 17, 2019 meeting, the Board of Education continued an investigation into the placing of a potential public question on the November 2020 ballot. Specifically, the Board reviewed the current and future financial challenges facing the district as well as reviewed the timeline of anticipated communication and engagement activities which are planned to occur between January and June, 2020.

The investigation into potential public question began in the summer of 2019 as the Board reviewed the financial deficits which face and district, has challenged the district for a number of years. It has been difficult for the

district to operate within a balanced budget despite numerous significant and ongoing efforts to control operational costs. One of the most critical factors contributing to this deficit is that Warren receives the least amount per student from federal, state and local sources than any other high school district in Lake County.

Due to the seriousness of this issue, the Board has partnered with firms explicitly to support the District in our communication and public relations initiatives surrounding this issue. At the November 19, 2019 meeting, the Board approved an agreement with *Beyond Your Base* and at a January 7, 2020 meeting approved subsequent agreements with *Public Opinion Strategies* and *Minding Your Business* to support engagement and communication efforts on this issue and to help share the District's challenges and engage the community.

Over the next six months, the District will be facilitating communication numerous efforts engagement and opportunities for our community. The Board must make a decision by August 2020 if the District intends to place a referendum question on the November 2020 ballot.

Board of Education Officer Transition

At the December 17, 2019 Board of Education meeting, the Board officially acknowledged the resignation from the Board Presidency by Thomas Drake. Mr. Drake is remaining on the Board, but stepped down from the presidency due to unanticipated personal work conflicts. As a result, past Vice-President Paul Schulz transitioned into the Board President role, and John Anderson was elected by the Board as the new Vice-President.

Ice and Snow - Take it Slow

Don't rush. When roads and sidewalks are slippery, rushing to catch the bus or driving faster to make it to your destination can have disastrous results. Students need extra time to get to the bus stop in cold, windy, or snowy conditions. Encouraging them to leave a few minutes early and take their time can reduce the number of falls on slick roadways and sidewalks.

Get a grip. Wear footwear appropriate for conditions. Avoid footwear with slick (no-tread) soles when walking on wet surfaces, snow, or ice.

Be patient. School bus drivers are trained to drive in inclement weather; however, snow and icy roads can slow down even the most experienced driver. Safety is each driver's top priority and extra time may be needed to get from stop to stop.

Time is on your side. Give yourself extra time when the weather is bad. Drivers who give themselves extra time to get to their destination help ensure a safe and appropriate speed for road conditions.

Remain alert. Pedestrians are more likely to be rushing during cold temperatures and could be hidden by poor visibility or snow banks. Remain alert for children who may be hidden or standing in or near the street at the bus stop due to mounds of plowed snow.

Drive for conditions. Adjust your driving behavior to the weather conditions. During winter, this often requires slowing down and increasing your following distance. Anticipate that bridges and overpasses may be icy and minimize acceleration and hard-braking.

Almond Campus Solar Project Update (as of January 16, 2020)


On October 18, 2019, District 121 officially began the construction of a solar project on the south end of our Almond Campus along Gages Lake Road, in a partnership Performance Services Inc. (PSI). This project had formerly been initiated in August 2018 after several years of serious investigation by the district into the construction of a solar project for the environmental, educational and financial benefits.





The project rests on two parcels on either side of the Warren Township High School entrance road on land that was previously unused by the school.

In October 2019, the project began with tree removal and excavation of the site. process ultimately transitioned into post installation, rack assembly, and panel installation, as well as the fence construction and the boring and installation of the underground cabling. As of January, 2020, these aspects of the project are also nearing completion.

When energized, the system will generate enough electricity to account for nearly all the energy usage at our Almond Campus saving the



approximately average of \$300,000 in annual operating costs.

Additionally, this project is a significant step in our efforts to be environmentally conscious.

This spring, senior students will be able to keep their Chromebooks when they graduate from Warren. There will be no additional fee for students to keep their Chromebooks. We are excited to be able to provide these devices to our students to continue to use in their future endeavors.

We have created a page on our website to provide all the information our seniors will need as they prepare to transfer their Chromebooks and Google accounts out of Warren's domain to personal-use accounts. In April, we will begin to communicate specific instructions and timelines that Seniors will need to follow in order to take ownership of their Chromebooks. Seniors will be given specific instructions to do the following:

- Transfer their Chromebook out of the WTHS Google Domain
- Move their Google Drive Files from WTHS Google Accounts to a personal Google Account
- Update contact information in Naviance
- Download assignments from Canvas, if desired

This process will not impact seniors' ability to complete any course work or final exams at the end of the year.



Senior Second Semester Final Exam Exemption Information

I want to remind seniors and their parents about our final exam policy and attendance incentive for second semester. All seniors will be required to take final exams second semester. However, they have the opportunity to be exempt if they meet the requirements of the grade/attendance incentive.

I am optimistic that all of our seniors will strive to meet the requirements of the incentive. Please be aware that the incentive applies individually to each class second semester. A student may meet the requirement in some or all of their classes. The requirements to meet the incentive to be exempt from second semester finals are as follows (NEED TO MEET ALL THREE REQUIREMENTS):

- A student has five (5) or less EXCUSED absences from a class.
- 2. A student has a B- (80%) or higher in class.
- 3. A student has zero (0) UNEXCUSED absences.

At the end of the day Friday, May 8, 2020, grades and attendance will be finalized in regards to the incentive. On Monday, May 11, 2020, students will be able to confirm if they met the criteria for each class that they are enrolled in and review for the final exam. As a result, if your student meets the requirements of the incentive, their last day of class will be Monday, May 11, 2020. If they need to take a final(s), they will take their final(s) on Tuesday, May 12, 2020. There is not an appeal process for the incentive as the information in PowerSchool at the end of the day Friday, May 8, 2020 will determine if the incentive has been met.
