Board of Education News

Dear Warren Community:

Now that Punxsutawney Phil has told us that spring is just a mere six weeks away, hopefully we can put the memory of the polar vortex behind us and continue to focus on the many important initiatives facing our district.

Maintaining a solid financial foundation is essential to delivering the quality programs our talented teachers and incredible students deserve. The Board worked hard to balance our annual budget and half way through the 2018-2019 school year, we continue to track positive to the annual plan.

Providing for safe and quality campuses is a high priority for the district. Our students, teachers, staff and community deserve nothing less. Our buildings are aging and many essential infrastructure areas need to be addressed to achieve that goal. Roofs, boilers, safety updates at each campus, locker rooms, athletic and theatre facilities all need to be maintained. Some projects (like the solar project and high efficiency boilers) can actually lower our expenses over time, i.e. pay for themselves. To support this important work, the Board authorized a restructuring of existing bond debt and an issuance of new bonds. These funds will allow us to prioritize these important repairs while actually lowering the short-term tax burden.

Lastly, we continue to work hard at staying ahead of the future challenges our district will face by updating and maintaining our five-year strategic plan. Department Report: Student Services

Dr. Keeley, Assistant Superintendent for Student Services, provided an overview of the Student Services department, highlighting their initiatives and programs. 
Solar Project Update

Testing Information

In April, all 9th grade students will be taking the PSAT 9, 10th grade students will be taking the PSAT 10, and 11th grade students will be taking the SAT. Detailed information about these tests and the schedules for our testing days will be communicated in the upcoming weeks.

Our scheduled test dates for this Spring are as follows:

- Tuesday, April 9: SAT for 11th Grade Students
 - O'Plaine Campus will be on a normal bell-schedule on this date.
 - o Seniors will not attend school on this date.
- Wednesday, April 10: PSAT 9 for 9th Grade Students, and PSAT 10 for 10th Grade Students
 - O Almond Campus will be on a normal bell-schedule on this date.
- Tuesday, April 23: Make-up testing for PSAT 9, PSAT 10, and SAT at both campuses.

Educational Technology

Beginning on Monday, February 11, 2019, we will be disabling automated push notifications for student grades to the PowerSchool mobile app. If enabled, automated push notifications are sent to the mobile app any time a grade is changed in PowerSchool. Our teachers regularly use the gradebook program with individual students to illustrate how different assignments can impact their grades. Sometimes this involves entering several scores for a single assignment. The most current version of PowerSchool's gradebook application requires teachers to save the score so the gradebook will calculate a new overall grade, which then generates a push notification to the mobile app. This has caused confusion for students and parents, so we are disabling that functionality. Automated push notifications for attendance will remain enabled.

Parents can still create their own schedule of email updates from the PowerSchool website. These email notifications are customizable and can be set for Daily, Weekly, Every 2 Weeks, or Monthly. You can also select the level of detail you would like to receive in terms of academic progress and student attendance. These notifications can be setup by logging into the PowerSchool Parent Portal.

In the Classroom

Students in our U.S. History classes at the Almond Campus researched advertising techniques used in the 1920's, and analyzed how many of the innovations in advertising that arose in the 1920's are still in use today. Advanced Placement Testing (AP)

Warren Township High School offers 26 AP courses over six departments. Students enrolled in AP courses are eligible to take the Advanced Placement exams at the end of their course for the opportunity to earn college credit. Students are charged a fee for each exam.

AP Tests are administered in early May.


