Washington Post: "America's Most Challenging High Schools"

**District 121
Earns National
and
International
Recognition**

Washington Post has announced the list of "America's Most Challenging High Schools" and Warren is on the list for the 8th year in a row. "America's Most Challenging High Schools" list is comprised of the number of advanced placement exams given by a school divided by the number of graduating seniors. Warren is ranked #49 in the state of Illinois and #1239 in the United States. Both of these rankings hold Warren in the top 4% of schools and a higher ranking than in 2016. Warren is very proud of their advanced placement numbers and results. This past year we administered 2,346 exams to 1,155 students.

Warren Hosts International Visitor

Sharon Henry is the Head of the Languages Faculty at Wellington High School in Wellington, New Zealand. During November and December, she was in the US on a travel scholarship looking at schools that use Flipped Learning in their classrooms, and came to visit us on November 30. Jon and Kris Bergman mentioned us as a lead Flipped Learning school that she should make sure to see while in Chicago. Ms. Henry was interested in seeing how we have integrated flipped learning into classrooms throughout the school and how our experience differed from that of Clintondale High School. She also wanted to know what issues we have faced and how receptive teachers were to the change. Ms. Henry visited with Foreign Language and Math teachers at the O'Plaine Campus. She shared with us that in New Zealand, high schools cover five years, Grade 9 (US Grade 8) through 13 (US Grade 12) so the opportunity to visit a school that focused on Grades 9 and 10 was especially useful for her.



2017 Advanced Placement Results

Advanced Placement (AP) exam results for the 2016-2017 school year were right on target for another successful year for Warren's AP program. In the spring of 2017, we had 1155 students take 2346 exams. The pass rate for these students was 85.1%, which is above both the state and global averages by at least 20% points. The College Board also recognized 454 Warren students for exceeding on their Advanced Placement exams. Warren had 144 AP scholars, which is awarded to those students who scored a 3 or higher on 3 or more exams. We also had 88 AP Scholars with Honor for those students who averaged a 3.25 on all of their AP exams and scored a 3 or higher on 4 or more exams. AP Scholar with Distinction award was awarded to 187 Warren students who had an average score of 3.5 on all of their AP exams and scored a 3 or higher on 5 or more exams. The last award is the National AP Scholar. This was awarded to 36 Warren students who averaged at



least a 4 on all of their AP exams and scored a 4 or higher on 8 or more exams. We are very proud of our students that spend numerous hours studying for these exams and would like to extend a special thank you to all of our AP teachers who spend countless hours on preparing our students throughout the school year.

Diversity Training for WTHS Staff

Warren Township High School partnered with Roger Moreano from Bridges Consulting to work with our teachers on Culturally Responsive Teaching and in particular how to create more inclusive and equitable classrooms. During the first semester, Roger recommended strategies to our teachers and administrators to become more culturally fluent and responsive while navigating potential social and political pressures that often seek to undermine diversity and inclusion efforts. We discussed how our American History and inherited society influences students from underrepresented groups. We recognized that when we become more responsive about these issues it would have long lasting effects on the potential academic success of all students. Mr. Moreano also met with our **Unite and Inform** (UNI) student groups after school at both the Almond and O'Plaine campuses. He provided guidance on some of the particular challenges these young leaders face while leading diverse groups. With their excitement and passion for diversity they are in the beginning stages of providing a student leadership retreat for many student leaders next semester.

Seal of Biliteracy Commendation Award on WTHS Diploma



Last school year, 52 senior students earned the Seal of Biliteracy on their Warren Township High School diploma with 44 students earning a Seal of Biliteracy in Spanish and eight students earning a Seal of Biliteracy in French. The Seal of Biliteracy has two components: an English Language qualification and a Foreign Language qualification. In order to earn the English Language qualification students must have an SAT English score of 480, ACT score of 18 in English or an ACCESS composite score of 4.8 for our English Language students. To meet the Foreign Language qualification students must earn a 4 or 5 on an Advanced Placement Foreign Language exam or a rating of at least "Intermediate High" in all 4 skill areas on the Assessment of Performance toward Proficiency in Languages (AAPPL) test. Both of these foreign language tests assess students on reading, writing, listening and speaking in the target language.

For the 2017-2018 school year, Warren has added the State Commendation toward Biliteracy Award. This award has the same two components for qualifications: English Language and Foreign Language. The English qualification is the same as for the Seal of Biliteracy, however, the change to the Foreign Language component is that a student could earn a 3 on an Advanced Placement Foreign Language or a rating of "Intermediate Low" in all 4 skill areas on the AAPPL Assessment of Performance toward Proficiency in Languages test. We are very pleased with our results from last year and hope to build on these recognitions for this school year.

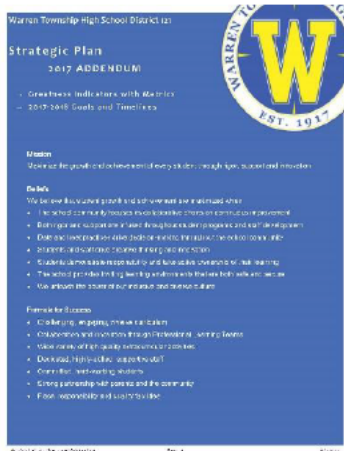
Warren Teachers Present at State and National Conferences

Sean Mahoney had the honor of presenting for the National Math and Science Initiative conducted at Hudson High School for Learning Technologies in Manhattan. As part of their "AP for ALL" initiative, they added other advanced placement trainings beyond the traditional STEM classes. Being a College Board trainer, Sean was able to present training on AP Psychology. Sean has been teaching at Warren for the past 18 years and has been instrumental in the success of our AP Psychology program.

Carrie Thomas and Jamie Zarnstorff presented at the annual Illinois Association of Teachers of English (IATE) conference. Their presentation was on *25 More Strategies in 50 Minutes to help you improve, streamline, simplify, evaluate and enjoy reading and writing in any classroom*. With many innovative teaching strategies, their workshop was well received at the conference. Both Carrie and Jamie have been teaching at Warren for the past 14 years with much success at the freshmen and sophomore levels.

Elizabeth Logan Hay presented at the Wisconsin Council for Teachers of English State Convention. Her presentation was on facilitating difficult discussions in a classroom which was well-received by her colleagues. Elizabeth has been at Warren for the past 16 years teaching English at both the O'Plaine and Almond campuses.

2017 Strategic Plan Addendum



In the fall of 2015, Warren Township High School District 121 embarked on a strategic planning process to help guide the priorities and work for the school for the next five years. The Board of Education approved this plan on December 15, 2015, and it will be reviewed and modified as needed annually. As the strategic plan is modified, updated versions will be available on the District 121 website.

On August 29, 2017, the Board revised the strategic plan to include goals and timelines about continuing our reaffirmation and commitment to building a diverse community at WTHS. The **Unite 'N Inform** student groups at both campuses and the **Parent Diversity Committee** strive to promote awareness of respect in many areas, such as curriculum and instruction, hiring and professional development practices to support a diverse staff and student body, enforcing the code of conduct and strict consequences for those who violate the expectations regarding inclusion of others and mutual respect.

Changes and additions were made to all six components of the strategic plan: Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment, Student Advocacy, Shared Leadership, Student Life, Community and Communication, and Securing the Future.

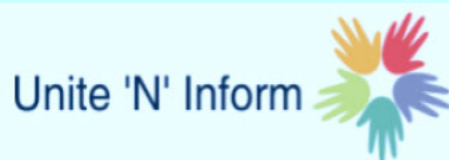

Officials of National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) announced the names of approximately 16,000 Semifinalists in the 63rd annual National Merit Scholarship Program. These academically talented high school seniors have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,500 National Merit Scholarships worth about \$32 million that will be offered next spring. To be considered for a Merit Scholarship® award, Semifinalists must fulfill several requirements to advance to the Finalist level of the competition. About 90 percent of the Semifinalists are expected to attain Finalist standing, and about half of the Finalists will win a National Merit Scholarship, earning the Merit Scholar® title.
