Referendum Question Postponed

At the April 26, 2020 meeting, the Board of Education modified the timelines associated with the current potential referendum question plan due to the pandemic. While the financial challenges of the District remains a very critical issue, the Board approved a recommendation to postpone a potential operating tax rate increase question on the April 2021 ballot.

This decision for a postponement focused on two very important reasons. The first is that the District's planning process depends on the Community Task Force being able to gather to collaborate and take ownership of the process, which logistically is not possible from a distance. Secondly and more important, more immediate priorities have emerged due to the pandemic.

Our WTHS community is working together to focus on immediate health, stress and financial security issues for our families.

The District anticipates picking up our task force work associated with a potential April 2021 referendum question in the fall.

Laura Oeffling Named Warren Township High School's Gurnee Teacher of the Year

Math teacher Laura Oeffling has been voted by her colleagues as Warren Township High School's 2019-20 Gurnee Teacher of the Year. Each school year, the Village of Gurnee recognizes three Gurnee teachers, including one from Warren Township High School District 121, Gurnee School District 56 and Woodland School District 50. The Gurnee Teacher of the Year receives a \$1,000 honorarium.



Oeffling has served in education for 30 years, teaching at Warren Township High School for the last 23 years and Waukegan High School during her first seven years. She loves teaching because the classroom offers a unique work environment.

"Students enter, often knowing nothing about a topic—say, for example, the Fundamental Theorem of Calculus—and then leave 45 minutes later with a good working understanding of it. That is thrilling," said Oeffling.

Oeffling believes math is its own language of sorts, and once students are taught how to speak it, a whole new world can open up for them. She also believes that organization and preparation are the most important tools in the toolbox of success, both in and out of the classroom.

One of Oeffling's fondest memories is working with former mathematics teacher and Assistant Superintendent Willi Gehrig to pinpoint specific ways to help students find success in the school's AP Calculus program.

"We set high goals, tracked the kids' progress, offered continued support and never lowered the standards for success," Oeffling said. "Getting the kids to buy into the challenge and rise to the standards set for them, while providing the support they needed to be successful, has been very rewarding."

"Laura is the role model for student-centered teaching," said Dr. John Ahlgrim, Warren Township High School District 121 Superintendent. "The time and commitment she dedicates in and out of the classroom to help her students reach their potential on an individual basis is second to none. We are so proud to help recognize her as our Gurnee Teacher of the Year."

Oeffling has truly appreciated the WTHS administration and the support they have provided the staff over the years. She is also very appreciative of the many brilliant, hard-working and fun peer teachers with whom she has been privileged to work.

"I understand that some kids will use math in their future careers and others will not. But whatever their future holds, I hope that one thing they all take away from their time in my math class is the knowledge of what it feels like to be really challenged and the confidence to persevere, work through it and overcome," Oeffling said. "Above all, this is the skill I want them to all walk away with for life."

Oeffling holds a bachelor's degree from Marquette University and a master's degree from DePaul University, both in mathematics education.

News from Instructional Services

We are committed to providing a world-class education for all of our students, and our teachers have worked tirelessly to do just that over the past few months.

Testing Updates

Spring testing was also dramatically altered this year. We have not received word from the State of Illinois about rescheduling the state-sponsored SAT that was canceled this spring, but we are hoping to learn more over the summer. We will communicate that information as soon as we have it.

Advanced Placement (AP) students this year had to adapt to some major changes in the format of their AP exams. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, students are taking their AP exams online in their homes. The students have been working very hard to prepare the necessary content and skills to be successful on these high-stakes exams. Exams began May 11 and will run through May 22. We wish our students the best of luck on these exams, and thank you to all our AP teachers for helping students prepare.

Textbook and Calculator Rental Collection

Students who have textbooks at home and/or who have rented a calculator this year should return these items to their campus. Curbside drop-off of these materials will take place at both the Almond and O'Plaine campuses May 18 - May 22, from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Seniors can drop off these items during cap and gown distribution.

Summer School

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, our summer school program will be delivered online this year. Information regarding the program is available on the <u>Summer School Page</u> of our website. We have also communicated with students who have enrolled for this summer.

Chromebooks

Graduating seniors will be able to keep their Chromebooks at no additional cost, as long as all registration fees have been paid. Students may find information on our <u>Senior Technology Page</u> on how to reset their Chromebook for personal use. This process should be completed after May 22.





Class of 2020 Graduation Requirements Modified

At the May 12 Board meeting, the Board of Education approved a modification to District Board Policy 6:300, Graduation Requirements, only for the class of 2020. Due to the COVID-19 Pandemic and as a result of Governor Pritzker's Executive Order 2020-31, the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) has granted school districts the ability to adjust graduation requirements for students in the graduating class of 2020. The spirit of this modification is to try and ensure that no graduation candidates were denied graduation due to the pandemic during their final semester.

The ISBE provided guidance to school districts regarding implementation of this executive order, which states that all graduation requirements can be reduced by .5 credit per subject area to account for the academic impact during the current semester. These changes only apply to students in the Class of 2020. All other students will be held to existing graduation requirements.

For Warren Township High School, we are decreasing the graduation requirements in English, Math, Science, Social Studies, Physical Education, Fine Arts and other electives each by .5 credit. This also results in an overall decrease of 3.5 credits necessary for the Class of 2020. Each year, including this year, the great majority of our seniors earn many more than the standard 22.5 credits in our Board Policy 6:300. Additionally, ISBE has waived the SAT participation and constitution test graduation requirements for members of the class of 2020, which are also waived as part of our amended district Board policy 6:300.

In The Classroom

Our staff have worked hard to adapt instruction during eLearning. Mr. Vanlaningham, a Government and Economics teacher at the O'Plaine campus, started eLearning by creating a series of YouTube videos to help explain to his students the economic side of the Covid-19 pandemic and the government's stimulus response. Incoming Freshmen Physicals

To comply with Illinois School Code, Section 27-8, it is mandatory that all freshman students, students new to high school and transfer students who were not previously examined for ninth grade have a physical examination and dental examination, along with verification of the minimum immunizations on file before starting school.

Early Turn In of Physicals

We know this is a difficult time to be thinking about visiting the doctor's office; however, it is important that students receive well visits prior to starting school. We are confident medical offices are taking the precautions necessary to serve you.

In an effort to eliminate being present at registration or standing in lines, we ask parents to upload the documents to streamline the process. Parents are encouraged to turn in their students' physical form in early and avoid the nurse's line at registration.

- The physical can be uploaded during the online registration process within PowerSchool in May.
- The physical can be emailed to <u>onurse@wths.net</u>, faxed to 847-599-4679 or returned to Warren Township High School before registration to take advantage of the early turn-in process. For now, we have a security officer at the front desk to accept paperwork from you.

Students will not be allowed to begin classes until nurses have verified that the physical and immunization requirements have been met. Physicals and immunization records submitted after registration may delay the student's start date.

Our nurses will review your student's physical and notify you of any problems before registration. Parents who do not take advantage of the early option must bring the physical and wait in line to see the nurse at registration. Any 9th grade physical (not a sports physical) within one year prior to our first day of school on August 15, 2019, will be sufficient.

Incoming Senior Mandatory Vaccination

Vaccines for meningococcal disease have long been on the list of inoculations that the CDC recommends for adolescents, especially before they head off to college. Effective January 1, 2015, all students entering the 6th and 12th grades are required to receive the vaccination.

Therefore, all students entering 12th grade will be required to show proof of recent meningococcal conjugate vaccination (MCV). All 12th graders who received their first dose prior to their 16th birthday must have a second dose on or after their 16th birthday. If receiving the first dose on or after their 16th birthday, only one dose is required. This vaccination will prevent children from contracting a severe bacterial meningitis, as well as other illnesses caused by the bacterium.

Some students may have already received this vaccine, as it has been recommended for various populations in the past. In this case, you would simply provide the school health office with verification of receiving the meningococcal conjugate vaccine. Documentation accepted as complying with the new state law requirement includes:

- A letter or note signed by your healthcare provider identifying the date the MCV was administered.
- A printout from your provider's electronic medical record (EMR) that indicates the vaccine was administered.
- A current Certificate of Child Health Examination form, specifying the date the MCV was administered.

Students will not be allowed to begin classes until nurses have verified that the physical and immunization requirements have been met. Physicals and immunization records submitted after registration may delay the student's start date.

In addition to your health care provider, many local health departments and pharmacies offer the vaccine. The Illinois Department of Public Health recommends that parents get their adolescent vaccinated now to avoid a last-minute rush during the summer. Once you have obtained or verified that your child has been immunized with the Meningococcal Conjugate Vaccine, please upload the document during the registration process. You may also fax it to 847-548-7171, email it to rnitto@wths.net or drop it off with the security officer at the front desk at the Almond campus. We will enter the information into PowerSchool throughout the summer. Again, we are hopeful parents and guardians can upload all documents to decrease or eliminate contact during the summer.

News from Business Services and Operations

District Funding Challenges and District Financial Reponses

The District continues to face significant financial concerns related to insufficient revenue in our annual budget and low overall accessible fund balances. As a result the school district did not have enough general funds to account for the expenses anticipated in May, June and July. Recently, the District executed two financial levers to help in the short term.

Transferring Funds - At the April 29, 2020 meeting, the Board approved the transfer of \$2.625 million from the working cash fund to the education fund to help with a cash flow challenge the District was anticipating due to low fund balances. This lack of funds was also magnified by additional revenue shortages the District experienced this spring due to our remote learning status. This \$2.625 million was specifically earmarked for cash flow and future projects in a November 2018 issuance of \$23 million in working cash bonds. The District intends on returning this \$2.625 million from the education fund to the working cash fund after annual tax revenues are received.

Tax Anticipation Warrants - Additionally, at the May 14 meeting, the Board of Education approved a resolution allowing for the short-term borrowing of up to \$12 million through the issuance of Tax Anticipation Warrants (TAWs). These TAWs will provide the District with funds necessary to pay for expenses over the next several months. Lake County has established a delayed county tax distribution plan for this year, and the school district will not have enough funds on hand to cover summer obligations based on the distribution schedule. The District will attempt to minimize costs and interest associated with these TAWs.

Solar Project Update

On October 18, 2019, District 121 officially began the construction of a solar project on the south end of our Almond Campus along Gages Lake Road, through a partnership with Performance Services Inc. (PSI). The project rests on two parcels on both sides of the Warren Township High School entrance road on land that was previously unused.

In October 2019, the project began with tree removal and excavation of the site. This process ultimately transitioned into post installation, rack assembly and solar panel installation, as well as the fence construction and the boring and installation of the underground cabling. The wiring connections have been completed and landscaping around the site has begun and will continue for several months.

Currently, we are anticipating the system will be energized on or around June 1—approximately one month ahead of schedule. Once energized, the system will generate enough electricity to account for nearly all the energy usage at our Almond Campus, saving the district approximately an average of \$300,000 in annual operating costs. This project is also a very significant step in our efforts to be more environmentally conscious.


