Board of Education News

Potential Funding Proposal Work Resumes

The Community Task Force, comprising business, civic, and educational leaders, resumed remote meetings this month to evaluate the District's funding challenges and proposed solutions. Due to COVID-19, this planning was paused, but the critical and importance and immediacy of this issue has prompted this committee to get back to work.

District 121 has the lowest per-student revenue of any high school district in Lake County. Despite significant efforts to reduce costs, including the decrease of more than 50 staff members in the last five years, the budget is difficult to balance.

This year, 12 Warren Township High School students virtually attended the 44th Illinois Summer Leadership Workshop. This workshop spanned

July 17-18 and was attended by FBLA officers and advisers from all over Illinois. At the workshop, officers participated in group activities andgames, received feedback from a panel of judges, and ran for mock state chapter positions. The workshop's theme was "Leave a Legacy."

Patty Hendrickson, Certified Speaking Professional, led this workshop alongside Sandra Bronson, Illinois FBLA State Adviser; Corbin Robinson, former Illinois PBL President and North Central Region Vice President, and the esteemed panel of judges.

Return-to-School - Remote Learning Continues

At its September 16 special meeting, the Board of Education approved the extension of our fully remote learning plans at least through November 6, 2020. We are making efforts to bring in smaller groups of students while we are on a remote learning plan.

Starting October 5, we will be implementing important modifications to our fully remote plan to increase expectations and learning.

- We are increasing the frequency of synchronous learning for our classes so that students will see their teachers more frequently. We are also hopeful that parents will encourage students to use the camera feature whenever possible, as the visual connection of students—even on a computer screen—can help create a sense of normalcy and connectedness within the class.
- Students will no longer fill out the daily attendance Google form, as teachers will now take attendance through their online classroom presence.

These modifications are now included in our fully remote plan, which is in the Academics section of our website and can be accessed at https://www.d121.org/domain/135.

To support this transition, our staff will have a remote learning planning day on Wednesday, September 30. Student attendance will not be taken on this day and students should use this time to catch up on assignments.

Additional Considerations Needed for In-Person Learning

We continue to receive guidance from the Lake County Health Department regarding the effective implementation of several illness management processes as we consider the possibility of safely resuming in-person instruction for all students. One such recommendation relates to COVID-19 "single-symptom-presumed positive" cases and how to vacate areas that may have been occupied by an individual who has a confirmed or suspected case. At this time, we do not believe we can safely allow large numbers of students return to our buildings for entire school days.

To that end, we are preparing alternative blended learning models with abbreviated in-person schedules to help mitigate the challenges associated with illness management requirements as they pertain our normal in-person school day.

We are also investigating possible onsite testing for COVID-19, which may help decrease the impact of the single-symptom-presumed-positive obstacle and potentially help WTHS open with one of several blended models.

News from Instructional Services

We are now several weeks into our school year, and our teachers continue to work extremely hard to create meaningful learning experiences for all our students. At the Board of Education Meeting on September 16, our Board voted to extend our Fully Remote Learning plan through November 6. We appreciate the feedback that we have received from our students and community through the first few weeks of our school year. That feedback was instrumental in helping us identify key areas for improvement in our plan, and we are making some important updates to remote learning.

All our classes will now meet synchronously every day they are scheduled. Students will meet online with their teachers during all scheduled class times to participate in lessons and assessments. Previously, one meeting each week could be allotted for students to work on independent lessons.

Synchronous

Students meeting in real time with their teachers during scheduled class periods.

By moving to all synchronous periods, teachers will now be taking attendance during each class period. We will no longer use the daily attendance form. Students must attend class, or they will be marked as absent for that period by their teacher. If there is an extenuating circumstance, please reach out to your student's teachers and guidance counselor so we can support your student.



One final item that will continue to be a point of emphasis during remote learning is the **use of cameras during online class meetings**. Currently, we are experiencing a large number of students who are not turning on cameras in class, even when prompted by their teacher. While we do not require cameras

to be on at all times during class, there are often points during the lesson in which students and teachers need to interact. The ability to see each other creates a far more authentic interaction.

When teachers are able to see their students and students are able to see one another, it is easier for everyone to interact and build relationships within the digital classroom. Teachers are able to see and react to nonverbal cues from their students. When students have their cameras on, they also will stay more engaged in the lesson, as they are now in more of an interactive format with their peers and teachers.


We also believe that video conferencing will continue to be part of all our students' lives in the future, and we have the opportunity to help them develop an important digital skill during this period of remote learning. We want to help them learn how to interact appropriately in an online meeting through the audio, video, and chat features of Google Meet. Please take a moment to discuss with your student the importance of using the camera on their Chromebook during class, especially when prompted by the teacher.



Testing Update

SAT

We administered the SAT on Wednesday, September 23, to our senior students. This SAT administration is a graduation requirement set by the State of Illinois and was also a valuable opportunity for all our students to take a free college admission exam. Our SAT administration will conclude on October 23 with the final makeup exam date. If your student was absent on September 23, please look for a communication from the school with make-up exam information.

We will be providing the PSAT/NMSQT for interested juniors on Thursday, October 29. Registration is open now and will continue through October 15. WTHS District 121 Receives Digital Equity Funding

The Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) announced school districts that were awarded more than \$80 million in Digital Equity Formula Grants. This funding comes from the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, which directs federal funding to governors and state education agencies to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Closing the digital divide has been a priority for the ISBE since March, when the pandemic forced schools statewide to suddenly shift to remote learning. In the spring, ISBE recognized that many schools did not have the technology or internet access necessary to connect students and teachers in real time and facilitate meaningful remote instruction. ISBE has learned and prepared a great deal since the spring, and we are excited to provide our highest-need schools the Digital Equity Formula Grant to strengthen their digital infrastructure this fall and for years to come.

Only school districts who have funding levels less than 70% of the recommended level to meet the students' needs of that district were eligible for this funding. WTHS D121 currently has a funding level of only 66% of the recommended funding for students.

The District received \$257,000 and is using it toward additional hotspots, cameras and microphones for teachers, digital remote desktops for career and technology department programs (Project Lead The Way and art classes), and additional software for enhancing instruction delivered during periods of remote and blended learning.

Face Masks on Campus and School Buses



Over the last several months, the district has been acquiring personal protective equipment, including face masks. We have an ample supply of different types of face masks for students and staff, as we do not want a lack of a mask to be problematic for anyone in our buildings.

Students are reminded that they are to have a face mask on at all times when in school buildings, except for at lunch and band. Also, students need to have a mask on as they enter a school bus and keep it on for the duration of their ride.

Please let us know if your student needs a mask. Our bus drivers have a supply, and we also have them at the entrances of each campus.



Grab-and-Go Lunch Service



The District will distribute graband-go meals for children who receive free and reduced-price lunch.

Officials of National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) announced the names of approximately 16,000 semifinalists in the 66th annual National Merit Scholarship Program. These academically talented high school seniors have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,600 National Merit Scholarships worth about \$30 million that will be offered next spring. To be considered for a Merit Scholarship® award, semifinalists must fulfill several requirements to advance to the finalist level of the competition. Over 90 percent of the semifinalists are expected to attain finalist standing, and about half of the finalists will win a National Merit Scholarship—earning the Merit Scholar® title.




