
#### **Board of Education News**

The following reports were presented at the February 26, 2019 Board meeting.

#### **Department Report: Transportation**

Jeanne Turf, Director of Transportation, provided an overview of the District Transportation department and the services provided. Some of the transportation statistics include the following:

- District 121 covers approximately 50 square miles
- 42 full-size buses traveled nearly 455,000 miles using 69,000 gallons of diesel fuel



- 4 activity buses are used by staff and coaches for small group events
- Students walk .6 miles to their assigned bus stop
- There are 55 bus routes for Almond and O'Plaine students, servicing 3,745 students
- There are 32 special education bus routes, transporting students to 30 out-of-district schools, work training programs and mobility trips.



Ryan Livergood, Executive Director of the Warren-Newport Public Library was featured in February as our Board of Education Partnership presentation. Ryan emphasized the library's efforts to continuously try to build programming and resources for students of all ages in the community and highlighted the success of the final exam study supports the library provides for our Blue Devils. Additionally, Ryan



praised our WTHS Trident Robotics team for their initiative and support for the development of youth Robotics programs, which is housed at the WNPL.



WTHS has had a very strong, long-standing partnership with the WNPL in our common pursuit to support life-long learning for our community.



#### **Swimming**

#### Wrestling

- A year ago, Joel Vandervere finished third in state as a freshman. As a sophomore, Joel Vandervere finished 15-1 on the year and only wrestled four matches entering into the post season because he was recovering from injury. Joel made the best of his limited time and placed first in the Lake County tournament and was also a Regional and Sectional tournament champion. To complete his season Joel wrestled in what is considered in this state to be one of the highest honors in wrestling. Last Saturday night in Champaign Joel Vandervere competed for a state championship in the finals at the 126 pound weight bracket. Joel lost the highly competitive match, however, this is quite a feat considering his limited time back from injury and he only being a sophomore. Joel is on his way to becoming the most decorated wrestler in Warren High School history.
- Austin Nash competed for a state title again this year. After qualifying for state as
  junior, Austin rededicated himself and made it a goal to get back to the state
  tournament. Austin was a match away from being an All American this past
  summer, and he entered the state tournament with only one regular season
  loss. With championships earned in the Lake County, Regional, and Sectional
  Tournaments.
- Isaiah Parker qualified for state this year in the 152 pound weight bracket. Last
  year Isaiah lost in what wrestlers refer to as the "blood round". Lose and go home,
  or win and go to state. Isaiah would not make the same mistake this year as he
  was triumphant in his semi-final wrestle back match at Sectionals to placed
  fourth, securing his position to wrestle at the state tournament.
- Cameron Domke qualified for state this year as a junior at 120 pounds. With a final record of 43-4 Cam had one of the most successful seasons ever for a Warren wrestler. Cam wrestled in the finals of every tournament this year including championships won in both Regionals and Sectionals in order to qualify for state.
- Sawyer Nash qualified for state for the second time. Sawyer won every tournament the team wrestled in this year including the Stagg, Whitewater, Niles North, Lake County, Regional and Sectional Tournaments. Leading into the state tournament, Sawyer Nash had a perfect record of 43-0. Sawyer was the captain and team leader for the entire season. With a final record of 45-2 and a two time state qualifier Sawyer Nash has cemented himself as one of the most successful Warren wrestlers ever.
