Board of Education News

Possible Limiting Rate Proposal

In recent months, Warren Township High School District 121 has been sharing information about a possible limiting rate proposal that may appear on the April 2021 ballot and gathering public input. We are grateful to the thousands of district residents who participated in our mail survey, webinars and/or phone/email poll. Your thoughts and recommendation will play an important role in how the District moves forward in addressing its operating needs.

Below are answers to important questions asked by taxpayers during the District's public engagement program.

Why is WTHS considering placing a funding proposal on the April 2021 ballot? Without additional funding, WTHS will need to continue making major cuts to staffing and programs. The District has already eliminated 51 teaching and staff positions over the past five years and reduced student support services.

How does the District's funding compare to other school districts?

WTHS has the lowest revenue per pupil when compared to other Lake County high school districts.

What has WTHS done to reduce expenses?

In addition to eliminating 51 teacher and staff positions the past five years, the District has refinanced outstanding debt, reduced the cost of employee benefits by joining a different healthcare cooperative, renegotiated vendor contracts, and pursued other cost-containment measures.

What is the funding proposal being considered and how would the proceeds be used?

WTHS seeks the community's input on a possible 60-cent limiting rate increase proposal to address the District's operating needs, including:

- Preventing the elimination of up to 46 more teaching and staff positions.
- Maintaining the 8-period day and eliminating the need to cut academic and elective courses.
- Strengthening programs that help ensure all students, including at-risk students, have access to and success in the most academically challenging programs.
- Restoring math and English intervention programs, mental health services, and other important student support services.
- Preventing the elimination or reduction of band, choir, drama and other activities/clubs.
- Preventing the elimination of many athletic programs or levels within programs.
- Ensuring adequate funds are available in the District's fund balance to address emergency needs, protect the District's credit rating, and eliminate the need for short-term borrowing.
- Bringing student fees in line with other Lake County high schools.

When will a final decision be made?

The Board of Education will decide on the timing and composition of a limiting rate proposal in mid-January 2021 after reviewing public opinion research, the recommendations of the Community Task Force, and other public input.

Return to School Status

COVID-19 numbers in Lake County continue to be above the incidence rate threshold of 14 per 100,000, and we are still experiencing significant community spread. However, these incidence numbers have come down significantly over the past month. We are hopeful this will continue over the next month.

Basic Netiquette Guidelines

BE RESPECTFUL

Treat everyone with kindness and respect. Please remember there are other people—with thoughts and feelings—who are viewing your communication. Use the same standards for your communication online as you do in a face-to-face setting. Think before you click *send*!

BE FOCUSED

There are limitless distractions when you're engaged in online learning. It may help to tell yourself that you are going to sit and focus for a certain amount of time, after which you will allow yourself to take a break. You'll be amazed how much easier it is to concentrate!

BE PRODUCTIVE

Remember, even though our school buildings are closed, *school* is still in session. You have a responsibility to engage in your schoolwork and continue making progress on your learning. Communicate to the best of your ability using the skills (writing, speaking, presenting) you've learned in school. Challenge yourself to learn something new each day.

BE SAFE

Do not post personal information online about yourself or anyone else. This includes addresses, phone numbers, social media account handles, ages, and workplaces. Keep in mind that even if you delete something you posted, it can still live online permanently.

BE RESPONSIBLE

Whenever you are sharing something that originated from someone else (video, picture, words, music, sounds), it is good practice to cite that source. This applies to discussion forums, too. If you read a great thought, share it, but be sure you let your audience know where you saw it first.


