

Board of Education News

Superintendent Search Update

The Board of Education is engaged in the process of selecting the District's next superintendent. The Board has enlisted the services of the Illinois Association of School Board's (IASB) Executive Search team to assist with this important work. The Board interviewed a slate of candidates on November 8 and 9, and from those interviews, the candidate pool will be narrowed to approximately two final candidates.

The final superintendent candidates will participate in a final interview process on the evening of Thursday, December 2. As part of the final interview process, the Board is seeking to identify a group of representative stakeholders (i.e., district employees, parents, and community members) who will (A) hear the finalists respond to questions and (B) provide feedback regarding each candidate. Important information about this volunteer opportunity includes:

- On the evening of Thursday, December 2, each of the final superintendent candidates will meet with a volunteer group of stakeholders to respond to predetermined questions, prior to being interviewed by the Board of Education.
- A limited number of WTHS 121 stakeholders will participate in the finalists' interviews. An IASB consultant will facilitate the stakeholder group's interview with each of the finalists. Participants will be socially distanced and will be required to wear a mask throughout the process.

The Board anticipates making a final decision and announcement regarding the district's next superintendent shortly before or after the winter break. If you have questions, please contact Board President, Paul Schulz at pseudoschalz @wths.net.

Superintendent's Corner

Get the Facts about the Referendum Question at www.d121.org/referendum

On August 17, the Board of Education approved a 60-cent operating rate increase question that will appear on the ballot June 28, 2022. A 60-cent increase would provide approximately \$13.25 million in additional revenue annually, with an estimated annual tax impact of \$200 (\$16.67 per month) per \$100,000 of a home's fair market value.

Increased funding would allow the district to preserve the eight-period school day, improve academic supports and mental health services, restore and protect activities and clubs, and restore and protect athletics. The rate increase would also allow us to lower student fees to rates comparable with other Lake County high schools.

A critical aspect of the district's referendum information efforts is to provide clarity and details regarding the impact to students with or without additional funding for the next two years.

There are several programs affected by the referendum question, including the length of our school day (eight-period day), academic and mental health assistance, activity programs, and athletic programs. The information on this page focuses on preserving the eight-period day.

Get the Facts About the Referendum Question: Investing in our Students

Preserving the 8-period school day

During the week of November 8, students began the course selection process for next year (2022-23 school year). Parents and students should be mindful of the potential reduction in course offerings if the district needs to implement a seven-period school day. This could have a significant impact on your student's academic plans.

As early as the 2023-24 school year, WTHS may need to move to a seven-period school day (in place of our current eight-period day) due to financial challenges resulting from our low funding.

Why is preserving the eight-period day important?

In a seven-period school day, all students will experience negative ramifications on their academic opportunities. Students will:

- Not remain as competitive for college and career opportunities.
- Miss out on current curricular two- to four-year programs or certification programs like: business, industrial tech, Project Lead The Way (PLTW), world language, and band.
- Restrict Lake County Technology Campus participation to senior students, even though the two-year programs are designed for junior and senior students.
- Lose opportunities to enroll in advanced placement (AP) and/or dual college credit classes.
- Lose the opportunity for multiple elective choices (for example, students will have to choose either: world language or band; PLTW or art, AP psychology or business).

In June 2021, the Board of Education approved a recommendation to reduce the required graduation credits from 22.5 to 18.5, effective for the class of 2022 and beyond. If the district were to move to a seven-period school day, the new graduation requirement of 18.5 credits would remain in place, as it will continue to be appropriate even with a decrease in course opportunities.

A successful referendum would also allow our district to maintain our current eight-period day for our students.

SAT Test Prep Opportunity


Warren Township High School has an amazing opportunity to help students prepare for the SAT test on April 13, 2022. We are proud to partner with Academic Tutoring Centers to offer junior students high quality SAT prep classes after school at the Almond Campus.

To best accommodate our students' busy schedules, we will be running two classes on Wednesday nights. Students can register for a 2:30-5:00 p.m. class or a 5:30-8:00 p.m. class. Classes will meet from February 23, 2022 through April 6, 2022, with a week off for spring break.

There is also a discounted rate of \$245 for those who qualify for the free/reduced lunch program. Registration closes on February 8, 2022.

Students can also earn **The Warren Way** coupons for wearing blue and gold on Fridays for a chance to spin the wheel of fun!




