Board of Education News

Almond Campus Solar Update

For over a year, the District has been planning for a ground mount solar project on the south end of our Almond Campus along Gages Lake Road. Construction was intended to be nearly complete by our return to school this year.

The project experienced very significant delays getting started this summer. Due to these delays, as well as a reduction in some of the SREC (Solar Renewable Energy Credit) financing incentives associated with the project since its inception, at the August 20 meeting, the Board voted not to extend the original project contract and reduced SRECS. Therefore, this particular project has ceased for now. The Board remains very committed to implementing green initiatives and alternative energy sources.



Finance Committee Meeting, August 20, 2019

On August 20, 2019, the Board of Education held a Finance Committee meeting for the purpose of reviewing and discussing the District's budget for fiscal year 2020, as well as the overarching district budget factors. This was the first of several meetings in which the Board will review the District's revenue and expenditures in light of the difficulty the District has had for several years in balancing the budget. The 2019 strategic planning process resulted in one goal for the District to facilitate open discussion regarding the budget, specifically the restrictions on revenue due to the relatively low local tax rate and local revenue per student compared to other Lake County high school districts.

WTHS has the lowest available funds per student of all Lake County high school districts, and this has been a primary reason the District will continue to find it difficult to balance the budget annually. At the August 20 Finance Committee meeting, in addition to reviewing the current approximate \$1.6M deficit tentative budget for 2019-2020, the Board discussed the efforts that have been made to continue to reduce expenditures, as well as the staffing reduction plan which has been in effect for the last several years. Investigation into further ways to reduce costs, as well as increase revenues will be discussed at regularly scheduled Board meetings as well as at future Finance Committee meetings.

Testing Information



2019 PSAT/NMSQT Exam

Warren Township High School will be administering the PSAT/NMSQT on Wednesday, October 16, 2019 at 7:25 a.m. This is an optional exam that any junior at WTHS can elect to take. Juniors will take the exam at the Almond Campus. [Click here](#) to register for the PSAT/NMSQT. Registration will close at 11:59 p.m. on Thursday, September 20, 2019. The cost of the exam is \$20.

The Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) is an optional test that provides students with great test-taking practice. Juniors who take the PSAT/NMSQT are also entered into the National Merit Scholarship Corporation competition as well as other scholarship and recognition programs. Advanced Placement (AP) Exam Registration



The College Board, creators of Advanced Placement, recently announced significant changes to the AP exam ordering process, deadlines, late fees and cancellation fees that will be mandated for all schools and all students beginning with the 2019-2020 school year. This year, all students will decide whether or not to take exams and order their exams by November 15, 2019.

All students in first semester or year-long AP classes who register after November 15 will be assessed a \$40.00 per exam late fee. In addition, a \$40.00 per exam cancellation fee will be assessed for any exam order canceled after November 15, 2019.

The ordering deadline for second semester only courses will be March 13, 2020. Students will register in class with their teachers for the exams on the College Board website. Students will then pay for the exams on the [Total Registration](#) page separately. All exams must be paid for by November 15th to avoid a \$40/exam late fee.

Educational Technology

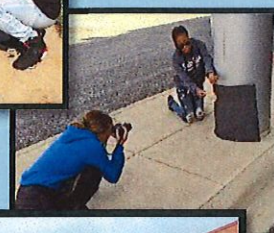
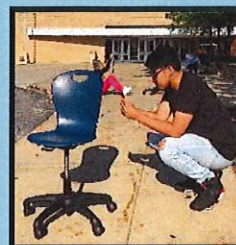

Professional Development

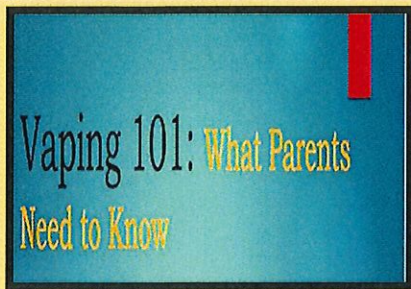
On August 7, 2019, our district leadership team met for a retreat to discuss organizational goals, instructional leadership, and our district professional development focus.

Attendance Matters!



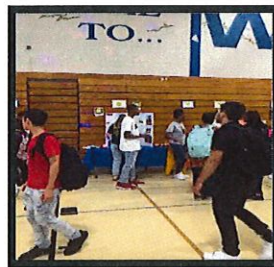
Please review the attendance procedures when your child is unable to attend school. We welcome your partnership with us in developing

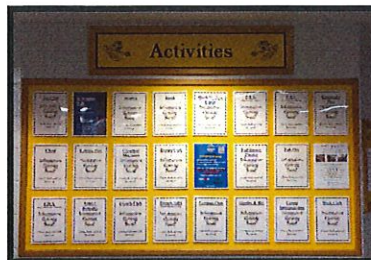

Educational Technology Infrastructure Updates

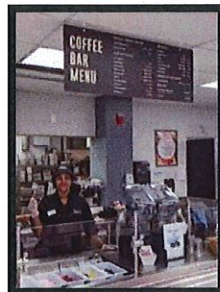

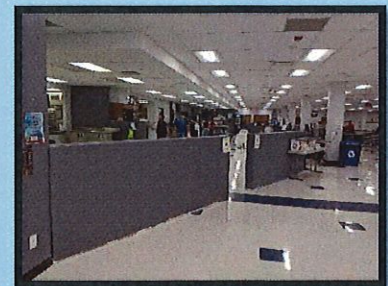
Annual Audit

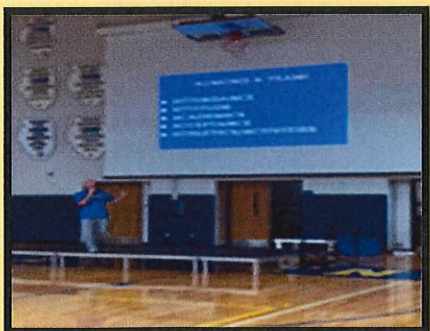

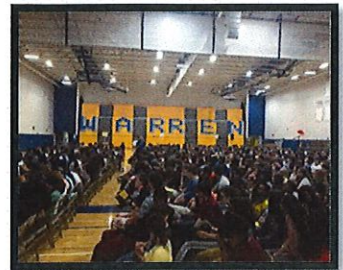

Principal's Corner at the Almond Campus

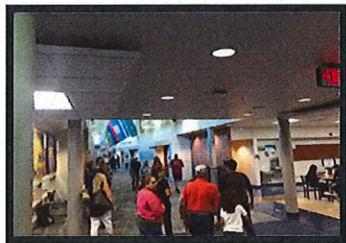

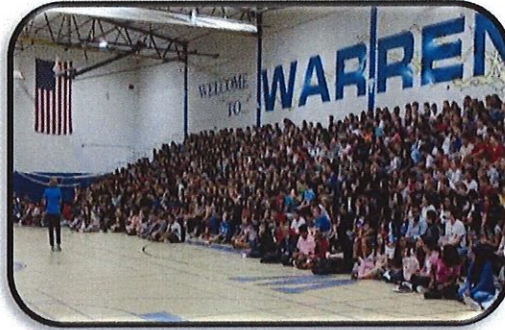
Principal's Corner at the O'Plaine Campus
